

# Won't you please help us continue helping children break free from a life of poverty by including World Villages for Children in your Will?

When making a charitable bequest, you may choose to leave World Villages for Children:

- a specific amount of money (Pecuniary Bequest)
- the residue or share in the residue of your estate (all property after debts, taxes, expenses, all other bequests have been paid)(Residuary Bequest)

The following are examples of standard wording for these two types of charitable bequests:

## Pecuniary Bequest

I give to World Villages for Children, Sackville House, 40 Piccadilly, London W1J 0DR (Registered Charity No. 1058973) the sum of £\_\_\_\_\_ for its charitable purposes and I direct that the receipt of the Financial Controller or other proper officer of World Villages for Children shall be a full and sufficient discharge for the said legacy.

## Residuary Bequest

I give my residuary estate (or state share in your residuary estate to be given) to World Villages for Children, Sackville House, 40 Piccadilly, London W1J 0DR (Registered Charity No. 1058973) for its charitable purposes and I direct that the receipt of the Financial Controller or other proper officer of World Villages for Children shall be a full and sufficient discharge for the said legacy.

We recommend that you consult a solicitor to help you draft your Will. A solicitor can give you advice, help you with any legal requirements and ensure that your will is properly prepared. By using a solicitor, you will be secure in knowing that your wishes will be fulfilled after your death.
